President's Podium November 2020

Honestly, where has this month gone? Seems like just yesterday I was writing last month's podium. Looking back there's been quite a bit going on though, and I've at least been riding the bike most days.

By all accounts it was an excellent weekend for those attending the North Island RAG Rally. Thanks to the organisers and to everyone who contributed to making it such a great event. I'm told everything ran very smoothly and all were blessed with beautiful, warm days despite very cold starts to the mornings.

The South Island RAG Rally is an event I'm really looking forward to, and I know of quite a few North Islanders making the trip down. Grant and I were out last weekend with Rodney and Geoff tagging along to scope out the route for the GS ride. It'll be a treat for those who haven't spent much time in North Canterbury, and there will be some challenge or other that will no doubt stand up to the notion of "adventure" riding.

You'll be aware of the 40th GS Anniversary relay that kicked off in Bluff early October and hopefully following its journey via Facebook. Over an eight-week period encompassing other club events, we're aiming to get our "Baton" to Cape Reinga. Area Reps are co-ordinating the effort across their own areas to make the links either side of their regions for the baton handover. The baton has already made it to Canterbury thanks to the efforts of the several members who seem to be having a great time showing it off in their photos. There's plenty of time to be involved in the relay if you want to, have a chat with your Area Rep or catch up with us at the SI Rag Rally or the GS Rallye in Martinborough.

Unfortunately, this year's BMW Clubs International Council delegates didn't get to meet in person in Austria as the event was cancelled due to Covid-19. I did however attend the Council meeting via a 4-hour virtual hui starting at 2:00 am our time on Sunday October 11th.

Aside from missing out on the usual "social networking" opportunities and getting to try out the best of the BMW fleet over a week away, it was great catching up with club delegates from around the world, especially those we got to know better in Palm Springs last year.

It was evident from the start of discussions that the impact of Covid-19 has been a challenge for all clubs. What was most interesting is how clubs around the world have dealt with it, some with no communication with members for almost 8 months. It's fair to say there's a certain amount of envy around the way in which Aotearoa has responded to the pandemic, and for the most part us being able to provide some continuity with club activities. The Council Chair called on me to talk to my report, noting with interest that our membership growth hasn't flat-lined or declined like many other clubs. Others on the Council commented positively on our move to carry out Board meetings virtually and more frequently, and the use of social media and Zoom meetings to keep people in touch. Other motorcycle clubs were particularly interested in our 40th GS Anniversary relay, and many wanted to know what "RAG" meant, and kind of liked the spirit of it.

One of the things delegates talked about included a desire for more pressure from the Council to be put on BMW AG to direct dealers to better support official BMW Clubs. This is not a new thing and is raised by the same people every year. As I've said before, it's my view that the relationship between clubs and dealers is a two-way street. If we want to retain exclusive support from our dealer network as a club, we need to be prepared to support our dealers through everything from purchasing bikes though to servicing, parts and accessories.

The last agenda item was the introduction of new guidelines detailing Corporate Identity basics for official BMW Clubs. BMW introduced a new roundel and logo design earlier this year for its European spring launch of the new M series. After more than 20 years of using a very familiar roundel, BMW says "we have now taken yet another and clearly visible step into the automotive future with the modernisation of its appearance". The upshot is BMW Clubs will be required to adapt their own logos to accommodate BMW's new design parameters. This will not materially affect the current imagery we've just recently agreed for our logo, it's just a new layout with the new roundel. We've got until the end of 2021 to get that done.

Jo and I will be heading north on Thursday 5 November making our way up to the 2020 GS Rallye that our friends at KiwiRider are hosting in Martinborough on the 7th, we're looking forward to another great weekend.

We're also booked for the club's Annual Rally in New Plymouth and very much looking forward to spending some time in Taranaki. If you're thinking about it, registration is still open. The form is published in this newsletter and you'll find it on the club website at www.bmwmc.nz

There are plenty of other local area events happening. Do yourself a favour and get in touch with your Area Rep, or keep an eye on the club website or our Facebook page. There's plenty to be getting on with!

Finally, another reminder that the Annual General meeting in January 2021 will see the end of the second term of a maximum of three (as per the constitution) for all six current Board Members. It is highly likely there will be a couple of retirements at the end of this term, although all positions are contestable. It's an ideal opportunity to have new people involved thus reducing the risk of all positions vacating at the same time in 2024. If you've been thinking about standing, or have been approached by someone because they think highly enough of you to ask you to stand, I'd encourage you to have a chat with any of the Board Members about their experience over the last few years. It's a real privilege and not at all as scary as it might seem.

Wherever your travels take you in this month; have fun and make good decisions!

BMW Motorcycle Club of Aotearoa New Zealand - Risk Management Plan

The BMW Motorcycle Club of Aotearoa New Zealand is an organisation whose members join together for rides to nominated venues and for other social occasions. The organiser nominates the destination and regrouping stages along the way, but otherwise has no influence upon the way that riders behave on the road. There is no element of organised competition in the rides.

Riding Code:

1. All Club members on Club rides shall do so as individuals responsible for their own safety and shall take into account the safety of others they encounter on the ride.

2. Club members are responsible for ensuring that their motorcycles are in a safe and legal condition, the minimum being to Warrant of Fitness standards.

3. Riders, Pillions and sidecar passengers where required, shall have as a minimum standard New Zealand Approved Motorcycle Helmets, and stout footwear, gloves and clothing that will be capable of protecting their body in the event of a mishap.

4. Club Members are to go to the aid of any others uffering a mishap.

5. Rider organisers shall nominate the destination for the ride as well as any regrouping locations or other stops. The organiser is not responsible for the other riders' behaviour or safety.

6. Riders shall ride at a speed and in a way that is comfortable for them. Do not ride outside your personal comfort envelope.

7. If a rider is unfamiliar with the route, they shall arrange to follow another rider who does know the way and who travels at a comfortable pace.

8. Riders who decide to travel as a group shall adopt a staggered riding formation such that there is an accepted following distance to the rider immediately in front. A reasonable following distance is indicated by a time of two seconds between riders for dry conditions and longer for inclement conditions and on loose surfaces.

9. The Ride Organiser and or the Club are not responsible for the participants' safety, and all participants participate at their own risk. All participants are aware that they are travelling on open public roads and are responsible for their own safety and compliance with the Road Rules and Laws.

History of the Register – Part 7

(Re printed from the October 1992 Newsletter)

Shell 500 in thick pea soup BMWOR scores.

March saw a well organised Register road trial take riders through a variety of back country roads to Kaukapakapa. Winners were Phil & Gail Scott on a Moto Guzzi. The return journey saw some cause for concern when a rear tyre blow-out sent the Southern's'69S literally "down the road". Rider, pillion and machine suffered a few dents!

An interesting article appeared in the March issue, on motorcycle loading. This question had been discussed previously when a rider carried one only loaded pannier on a journey, and was convinced that this caused a cornering tumble. Quoting a BMW 75/7, 2-up with all accessories, the chart gave a manufacturers recommended maximum load of 871bs. They also recommended a maximum per axle with 3961bs front and 6191bs rear. "Presumably this may have something to do with maximum tyre loads, spoke loads, axle loads or handling properties. Whatever the case you cannot afford to ignore such recommendations in the long run, and get away with it".

This Newsletter also saw a detailed article on the necessity for ear-plugs. Wind roar was the problem and it did contribute to hearing loss over the years. Cottonwool was only 11 % effective, moulded wax 50% effective. (It is interesting to note a recent 1992 article on the subject where helmet manufacturers have been approached on their lack of progress in this area).

The Shell 500 saw riders again take to the back roads from Helensville, Huntly and Hamilton, much of it in thick pea-soup fog. The Register had 9 riders entered and the end result showed Pete Butterworth (90/6) second place overall, and the BMW Owners Register Team also placed 2nd.

The April '78 National Rally yet again showed the enormous popularity of this event with attendance increasing. Forty-nine members attended with numerous visitors calling in over the weekend. Scoutlands at Wanganui the venue with Ross Glenny putting in much effort to ensure success. The first of our serious gymkhanas provided a great afternoon of entertainment with Ray Holmes taking the leader board and Ross merely a couple of points behind.

The April newsletter also saw an article on the Accident Compensation Commission intended levy increase, and the effect on motorcycles. It was the beginning of an on-going saga which involved Walter de Beurs in considerable research in his efforts to dis-prove the many "headline" figures on the seriousness of motorcycle accidents. The full analysis of these reports left many a motorcyclist, subdued.

The half-way house at Taupo yet again bulged at the seams as BMW owners rode from far and wide to attend. The cool, damp weather had little effect on attendance. Unbeknown to all, it was to prove the last get-together here with Phil being transferred to Auckland. The Scotts personally had contributed greatly to Register interaction and friendship. Their central North Island home created a store-house of happy memories and strengthened our N.Z. links.

During May a presentation was held at Jensen Motors for the Shell Trial, with Peter Butterworth receiving a pair of BMW cufflinks, and the Register overall thanked for their participation in this highly publicised event.

The June newsletter saw the first of many detailed articles on BMW ownership, long distance touring and the overall maintenance of these machines. This contribution came from Barry Williams, owner of the first /5 model in N.Z. (cost \$2,260, from John Hempleman Motorcycles in 1972), and highlighted his trouble-free long distance touring (apart from clutch problem at 16,000 miles). An article from Brent Mander on "The problems of Associating", added to his list of welcome contributions to the magazine and a continuation of Walter's survey of BMW owners in relation to accidents. It also pointed out that although it sounds nice to blame other vehicles for much of our ill fortune, it proved to be a very weak argument vis-a-vis the A.C.C. From their point of view, motorcyclists are at fault for choosing to ride, instead of drive.

During July, an interesting Social occasion took place at the Auckland City Council. The BMW Register, with the Italian Owners Club, made the most of an opportunity to meet up with the Traffic Dept. An evening of films and talk benefitted all present. An article from Massachusetts, and Neil Barnard's 512 mile trip to the Niagara BMW Rally, and North around Lake Superior made enthralling reading somewhat over-riding the Club run write-up to Waingaro Springs.

The major event during August was a weekend trip to McLaren Falls at Tauranga and September heralded the beginnings of the AGM and National Rally arrangements. It was also decided to hold a rather more ambitious Christmas function and an evening at 'Pinesong' was decided upon.

Thirty-six members attended the AGM at Kay Drive in October. John Samson accepted a further term as President, with Jean Southern as Secretary. Discussions revolved around the National Rally at Woburn on November 11. The year had also been one of much activity for Meryl with hulk purchasing, the A.C.C. issue taking up much time and investigation. Thanks were expressed to her as Secretary for a year of constant workload.

Fifty-seven members and friends participated in an evening of colour slides at Neil Barnard's. It highlighted a dream for many and the evening was a memorable one. Paul Clements wrote of his 22nd birthday present (to himself) - a 750 BMW. And the 2/3rd December would see a trip to the new Army Museum at Waiouru.

December 1978 - A New Year Thought was printed on the front page of the Newsletter –

"The Register must take its course in growth, and hopefully it will always succeed in this respect where others have failed. No doubt there will be problems, but only you, the members, can show the way to the continuing success of the BMW Owners Register".

Thirty-members attended the meeting and correspondence had been received from Parliament in answer to our protests. It was decided to approach the Transport Minister direct once a Cabinet re-shuffle was completed. An organised event between the Register and the Italian Owners Club was agreed upon and February 17 would see a "fun day" at the Pukekohe Race Circuit.

The Saturday Club run to Waiouru, with the Army (in the form of Paul Hayes) showing the way gave riders a round trip of 520 miles and an enjoyable day out.

The Christmas party at the 'Pinesong' Restaurant Night Club proved to be a huge success for the 45 folk attending. Highlight of the evening was the Snow White & the Seven Dwarfs production featuring "Dopey Hayes and Doc Robinson" in a convincing performance. Well after midnight the group headed back to the Southern's house and hospitality for a night-cap or two.

BMW M has created a seriously fast motorcycle



Ever wanted BMW's M division to make a proper motorcycle? Your wish has been granted.

BMW's high-performance M division has diversified into two wheels. Meet the first-ever M 1000 RR.

Based on the current S 1000 RR – which isn't a slow machine by any means – the M 1000 RR pushes power up from 152kW to 156kW thanks to a higher redline, forged pistons, adapted combustion chambers, higher compression and longer, lighter titanium conrods, among other changes.

Torque remains at 113Nm but a slight retune has resulted in a wider mid-range between 6000rpm to 15,100rpm. Along with BMW's ShiftCam variable valve timing system, the M 1000 RR should be a proper rocket on the track,

This is the M division's first proper go at a motorcycle. If the standard S 1000 RR is anything to go by, this will be absolutely insane.

Weight has been reduced by 5kg to 192kg fully fuelled, thanks to carbon wheels as standard and a new lightweight titanium exhaust system for more decibels.

You'll notice the presence of winglets, a first for BMW and likely the result of wanting to use them in its World Superbike racer where regulations state the racer can only use winglets if the street bike has them too. Apparently, they create 16.2kg of downforce at unspecified speeds well north of 200kmh.



Carbon winglets up front, a lighter titanium exhaust and more power? Sign us up.

The chassis has been tweaked with "optimised" front forks and a revised central spring strut at the rear. The rear swingarm is lighter and longer than the standard S 1000 RR too.

M has given the bike its own blue M-branded brakes, though it's unclear if these are actual M-spec brakes or rebranded third-party units from a player like Brembo.

The normal S 1000 RR has an M Performance package and, surprisingly, so does the M 1000 RR. Called the 'M Competition' pack, it basically applies the entire options list to turn the bike into a proper race machine.



The M division has been quite busy recently with the new M3 and M4 debuting last week.

New Zealand pricing and availability isn't confirmed yet but Americans are bracing to pay a starting price of US\$32,900 (NZ\$50,200). That is roughly double the cost of a standard S 1000 RR, which starts at US\$16,995 (NZ\$25,923).

The vanilla bike costs \$35,590 here, to give you an idea of the differences in price between a currency conversion and actuality.
