



January's East Cape Jaunt

ach year, generally with the justification of attending all or part of the National Rally, a group of typically 4 to 6 'senior' Rangitikei couples endeavour to do a road trip with the joint aims of enjoying some social involvement and having the opportunity to take in some of the sites between home and the Rally venue.

This year was no exception although due in part to a degree of uncertainty regarding the proposed Rally programme, as at the time we needed to make travel and accommodation bookings, not all of those in the group planned to attend the actual Rally. (subsequent reports have confirmed that eventually all the usual Rally activities were catered for and the rally was a great success; in hindsight maybe our loss but 'well done' to the team that put it all together).

Our proposal was simply to arrive in 'The Bay' on Saturday and then take a few days



getting around East Cape, eventually parting company at Havelock North and heading to our various home destinations. Five couples originally planned to make the trip but one couple opted out when they got a 'better offer' to go on a ski trip to Whistler in Canada. East Coast storms during the two weeks leading to the trip caused a lot of damage and cast doubt on the

viability of the trip, but things settled and roads were open by the time we were due to leave.

The first day, Friday was a short trip to Taupo and then to head on to the Bay on Saturday. However, as my bike was coming due for the 20k service (at Mount Motorcycles) my pillion and I elected to head to the Bay on Thursday, get the service done on Friday morning and then head back to Taupō to meet the others on Friday afternoon. All went well for us on the trip up but as we hit the 'rush hour' traffic coming into Tauranga, and had to slow to about walking pace, we also got caught in a downpour and despite putting on our 'wets' we were soaked by the time we got to our motel. Typically the rain stopped just after we

got to the motel and most of your gear was dry by the morning. We enjoyed a great walk around the beaches in the sunshine on Friday morning, while Darryl and the boys attended to the bike, and then an uneventful trip back through Pyes Pa and SH 30 to Taupō to meet up with the others.

Following a mid-morning departure on Saturday, we headed for Rotorua via Poihipi Road, Tirohanga Road and SH30; some cruisy

at the Te Kaha Beach Resort. Some of us took the opportunity to enjoy a dip in the Resort's pool. Rain had been threatened during the day but apart from a few spots from time to time, we had a dry ride.

Monday also threatened to bring rain but apart from some wet roads we had, essentially another dry day. Heading

eastwards from Te Kaha we stopped to view the impressive Anglican church at Raukokore and then enjoyed a coffee at Waihau Bay. From there, as we headed round the Cape, we noticed increasing road damage with slumps and damaged seal. Peer, on the lead bike, took us down a side road to view the bay at Lottin Point and from there it was back to SH 35 and on towards Hicks Bay. Further signs of damage were evident both to the road, to river and



riding on good sealed roads while dodging the roadworks on SH1. Following lunch in Rotorua we headed for 'The Bay', some of us to Tauranga to attend the Rally ASGM and dinner and the others to Whakatane.

Sunday morning saw us re-group in Whakatane, take the short ride to Ohope Beach for a coffee, and then head on to Opotiki for lunch. The afternoon ride was also relatively short, taking us around the coast to Te Kaha where we were booked into very acceptable (and well-priced) accommodation



3. Presidents Annual Report from the Board

BMWMCANZ 2022 Annual Report

Well, I just can't believe that it's been close to a year since I was privileged to be elected as President of the club at our first virtual AGM which was held on the 13th of February 2022.

COVID was again causing major disruptions across the country. The government had only recently introduced the new Traffic Light Framework and at the time of the AGM we were in the RED setting as the first Omicron cases had just been detected late in January. Our National Rally which was planned to be held in Methven that same month unfortunately was another casualty and I remember vividly when the board had to make the call to cancel it. It was a very stressful time for everyone.

The 2022 Annual General Meeting and Board elections saw quite a significant change of guard in terms of board members. At the time I took on the role of Club President, replacing Garry Williams, Stephen Parkinson was elected into my vacant Vice President role and David Fish into the Club Secretary role taking over from David Ross. My hat goes off to both Garry and David for their unwavering commitment to their time on the Board and for putting up with the inevitable regular "can I pick your brains" phone calls when we needed advice. I'm not sure how we would have gotten through this year without their guidance, support and historical knowledge. Also, as always, Barry Petherick, our Membership Secretary has been doing a sterling job dealing with new memberships and renewals. Thanks, Barry.

Philip King who was elected as Member Representative in 2021 stood down from the role later in August 2022 for personal reasons. I want to take this opportunity to thank him for the time he served on the Board. Ian Macartney was seconded onto the board to fill this role on a temporary basis. Ian has very kindly decided to put himself forward for nomination to take on the role fully at the forthcoming 2023 AGM.

EVENTS 2022

Despite the cancellation of the 2022 National Rally, with the introduction of the Traffic Light system and the gathering limits under the RED setting increasing from 100 – 200 people later in March, the decision was made to continue with the North Island Rag Rally early in April. I think we had over 50 attendees which made the weekend a real success. We were all ready to have the opportunity to catch up with friends and enjoy the social aspect of our memberships which is such a big part of our club.

BOARD / AREA REPRESENTATIVE Face-to-Face Meeting

We were also able to run our combined Area Reps / Board meeting at the end of April. This was a great opportunity for the team to get together and discuss where the club is at, identify areas for improvement and how we can continue to drive the club forward. Some excellent initiatives and ideas were suggested, and many have either already been adopted or are still in the pipeline. All are focused on improving the value proposition for members.

Our volunteer Area Representatives give up their time to organise rides and manage their geographical areas on behalf of the club. They are the ones that are interacting with local members, and they are constantly receiving feedback, good, bad or indifferent. As a team, they do a key job and we all need to recognise the commitment they make and support them where we can in undertaking their roles.

BMWMCNZ GS Rally – Lakes Ranch ROTORUA

Unfortunately, I was unable to attend this event however all the feedback I received both prior and post was that it was a great success. The idea of this event was developed during our Area Rep meeting by Stephen Parkinson. Whilst the GS Rally is not new, the idea to hold it at Lakes Ranch and to combine resources with Kiwi Rider was. A huge amount of organisational effort goes into these events and it was really pleasing for all those involved that it went off without a hitch. Well done again to all those involved.

South Island Rag Rally – Geraldine

There were some issues initially with this event which caused a delay in our ability to communicate the location and timing as early as we would have liked. That said, we had a great number of attendees with more than 65 people registering for the Saturday night dinner. Many travelled from across the country to attend which was really pleasing. The weather Gods were not kind to us, but a big hats off to those who stuck it out in their tents at the campsite.

OPERATIONAL UPDATE

Throughout 2022 the board have been working hard to try and improve our member communication and engagement. Our Area Reaps are currently working through the process of using an external mailer platform that will enable us to create a template to standardise our regular messaging to members. Some have adopted this already and others are still working through the setup process. We have also updated our new member welcome pack.

It is really pleasing to see the marked improvement in the monthly magazine. This has predominantly been driven by Colin Gates our Treasurer who also currently wears the Editor hat. An immense amount of energy and effort from him with the support of the content submitters has gone into improving the image quality, the readability, and the reading options that we now have. I particularly like the flip book option. A big thank you to Colin for his expertise in this area and to all those who submit monthly editorials for the magazine, your contribution is appreciated.

Thanks also go to those organisations and individuals who pay to advertise in our club magazine. This advertising revenue helps cover our publishing costs and as members, we need to recognise our sponsors and support them when we can.

Our insurance partnership was due for renewal during the year. We spoke to a number of providers during the review process and ultimately, our partnership changed from AON to Star Insurance. It's never easy making these types of changes however the superior, more comprehensive, and competitive offer from Star was accepted by the Board. We are really looking forward to strengthening that partnership in the future.

Club membership over the last year has been steady with a small growth over the period. Initiatives such as discounted rates for the GS Rally for club members have helped with gaining new members however, we are still not as strong as we would like to be in the retention space. We are revising the membership renewal process to make it a little more personal and user-friendly. Also, for those members who choose not to renew we are developing a brief exit survey to try and better understand their expectations and to see if there was anything we could do to help retain their membership.

It has been a pleasure to work with the new look board over the last year and whilst we have experienced a few challenging headwinds, as a team we have been able to stay focused and deliver on our commitments. I am very proud of what we have achieved so far and I would like to personally acknowledge each board member for their willingness to give their own personal time to help guide the club.

To all our members from lifers to newbies, thanks for getting involved and making the club a success. I look forward to seeing many of you in the events and rides we have planned for 2023.

Treasurer's Financial Statements for the Financial Year ended 2022.

It gives me pleasure to present to our members the Treasurer's Report and Statement of Financial Position for the twelve months ended 30th September 2022.

We prepare our accounts on a 'Cash' and <u>NOT</u> an 'Accrual' basis. Therefore, they do not consider any outstanding debtors or creditors as of the balance date. However, when prepared, there was no other abnormal costs/income expected, from the normal operational income and expenditure.

Operational Income & Expenditure:

Income: Operating income for the period was \$38,598 compared to \$39,593 for the

previous 12 months.

Subscriptions Up by \$2,512 compared to the previous 12 months

Expenditure Operational costs for the 12 months - \$28,536 compared to \$17,721 for the

previous 12 months. The increase is largely due to face-to-face meetings

happening once more and the Area Rep meeting taking place.

Administration Up by \$1,433 to \$1,595. Includes \$1,071 for Membership Card blanks.

Travel & \$7,815 up by \$5,659. Reflecting that face-to-face meetings are functioning again.

Meeting Costs Although most meetings are held online via Zoom.

Surplus/Deficit The result for the year is a reported operating deficit of \$1,751.

As reported last year, we received advanced payments for events that due to Covid concerns were unfortunately cancelled. The deposits received in last year's

accounting period were refunded at the start of this financial period.

Net Assets as of 30th September are \$59,555

Post AGM Discussion

Scott Mills – Congratulations to the Editor, Colin Gates, for the quality of the monthly Newsletter.

Geoff Gover – had a question regarding what the club was doing to improve membership.

• David Fish – Membership has increased approx. 10% in the last year. The problem has been member retention and for various reasons, a number of members leave, impacting the growth of our membership. This has been an ongoing pattern for some years and one we are addressing. We aim to raise the visibility of the Club and events, to improve and advertise the benefits available through the club, and also improve our member's experience by increasing the number, quality, and suitability of ride events, improving communication at a local level when and where events are happening.

- Steve Parkinson probably the best example of this is the very successful BMWMC GS
 Rally, run in October, in association with Kiwirider magazine. The idea was to increase
 Visibility, by branding the event and giving a \$30 discount on entry fees to our members.
 This will be an annual event, initially for 3 years but hopefully ongoing. The intention is to
 grow it towards an even bigger, multi-day event.
- Colin Gates We have also instigated a program of contacting people who have not renewed, asking if it was an oversight and/or how could we improve. This has proved successful in finding members who had fallen through the cracks and subsequently renewed. For the few who did not wish to renew the feedback received was extremely useful. Some reasons we can address, and some are just outside of our control i.e. no longer riding.
- It is apparent that many members were/are unaware of just how good some of our member benefits are – Ferry charges and conditions are a good example of how our annual subs can be easily recovered with just a couple of crossings. Many members were unaware that those discounts included cars.
- We have been discussing how the club could use internal resources to organise training,
 particularly specialist subjects i.e. seal-road and off-road training.
- We welcome the support from Star Insurance, who have been very supportive offering better value to members.
- We are looking to develop ideas on how we can better engage and recruit younger members – social media, types of rides etc.
- Chris Souness also developing a program where new BMW owners can be immediately identified and recruited, by having Distributors offer a first year of membership to purchasers.

Ian Sowden – comment that the discount did apply to cars, but make sure you carry your membership card, as they do ask to view it.

Henry Plowright – asked if the discount applied every time.

- **Colin Gates** yes, with the understanding that there are the high season dates where it has never applied.
- Interislander is making some changes, and they have a new manager coming, which may bring changes that we are not yet aware of.
- **Folker Liebonow** asked if membership reminders were by email.
- **Chris Souness** yes, that is correct, it's an automated system. However, we are aware that there are some database issues we have three databases, for various things, that

don't yet talk to one another. The intention is to combine them into a Web-based common system, with improved ease of use.

Chris Townson – enquired if the NI Rag could move around like the SI Rag.

• Steve Parkinson – this is definitely something that has been discussed, the relative merits of traditional Rally at Pokaka, versus the wider experience of moving it around. This was overtaken by events in 2022 with Covid – it very nearly didn't happen at all. In the end, it was only by Taylor Lodge coming to the party, allowing us a fee based on the lower numbers we anticipated. Because of that, and the difficult year the Ruapehu District has had with snow cover, we felt that a degree of loyalty was in order, and not to move the event for the moment. We do intend to revisit the issue later.

Trevor Martin – commented that the issue could be resolved by leaving NIRAG as is, and introducing further RAG-style events

• David Fish – yes of course. This is where we have been encouraging the Area Reps to get their heads together, and have the ad hoc Rally concept, similar to BoP, Auckland and Northland riders getting together in Russel for a weekend mid-winter. Something similar is being discussed for say Raglan, where Waikato, Taranaki and maybe even further south riders could be attracted as well as the previously mentioned 3 regions.

The meeting finished at 18:40 with the presentation of the Life Membership badge to Noel Walker (Life Member since 2005!).



Membership report.

Membership numbers remained strong and quietly increased through 2022 as we emerged from the shackles of Covid.

Recruitment was steady and we are focusing on a number of initiatives to keep the membership package attractive to old and new members alike. Even small things like the new membership card sleeves for the mailouts giving a more professional standing. Area Reps have bundles of BMWMCNZ business cards which are being liberally sprinkled on BMW bikes found parked up and down the country. The BMWMCNZ stickers are popular and are going out to members as they renew. Ideal for putting somewhere prominent on the bike or helmet.

Mid 2022 we streamlined the region numbers to better align with the number of Area Reps we have and easier reporting. The previous twenty two Areas has been reduced to thirteen. This process also moved the old Area 4 (Te Awamutu) from Bay of Plenty to where it belonged in the Waikato.

The Board has made membership retention a priority as we move through 2023 and beyond. This is something all members can be aware of and help with as we try and actively grow the club numbers.

The Concourse & Gymkhana were a hoot and well done to everyone who took part.



Riding the 35 (Or; After the A'gem is over)

t wasn't so much the event but the getting there. No. Actually, to be correct, it was the return trip home. Going up was an overnighter with a sleepover at Rusty Nails, Taihape: It was so quiet there and I didn't even see/met the owners! The return ride was via the East Cape and back home through the Wararapa over five days.

After a slow start deciding and organising the trip to the Tauranga meeting, Dave O and I settled for an AGM attendance on Saturday night. Our Trinity Wharf (Tauranga) room was at the other end of the hotel without a view. But considering one is asleep with eyes shut, the 'good view' is of no matter! If one is going to go ride some 500 km to attend, then why not make a

trip of it? The East Cape it was as I haven't been to this area for at least ten years.

We departed Tauranga at about 7.30 am Sunday morning and refuelled bikes (and us) at Opotiki. The first food place we found open was in the main shopping street opposite the police station. There were a couple of locals sitting at an outdoor table opposite us and we got chatting, but just at the small talk level.

We arrived at Hick Bay motels about an hour early, but that was not a problem for them. This was the only place that had available rooms when I made the booking and it was adequate enough with a meal available too. (Pub menu.)

Monday morning breakfast was on the road and there was nothing available until Te Puia Springs. We did stop over to check out the oldest pohutukawa tree in NZ at Te Araroa.

One noticeable thing about the traffic was the proportionally high number of logging trucks. Passing was not a problem for the twisty windy road - it did have good straight stretches of road and an abundance of passing lanes and slow lanes. This ride was not so long after the area had had wild weather. The road took a beating with washouts and flooding. The road is a State Highway (35) and repairs are funded by Central Government. The repairs were carried out in quick time to give access

to the towns and people. Evidence of the storm was easy to see, with slips, caveins and woven grass through all five of the number 8 wire of the fences. The worst affected section was between Te Aroha and Ruatoria. Fine silt was left over paddocks on both sides of the road and a large part of the speed limit was reduced to a temporary 30 kpm There was a high count of one-way parts of the road where a slip had taken the road and/or lowered the seal level about 150 mm. Those were patched with hot seal as a ramp. Nevertheless, it was hard on the suspension and body. I have to give kudos to the folk who opened the road as soon as possible to get the route re-opened.

I was a little concerned about the level of fuel in the tank. The R1200C has a 17 litre tank and after 300 Kms I am looking for a pump. I have found low populated areas (away from towns and cities) have a dearth of 95-grade petrol. The Catlins and the West Coast (S.I.) are two areas I have found that lack the 95-octane rating. My engine pinks when 91 is used and I always fill it with the red pump. While not on reserve, I swung into Ruatoria to check out 95 availability. Allied had an outlet and only 91 and

diesel. While I dithered in the decision-making, I got talking to the attendant. (Turned out he was the same age as me and we departed friends. Just bring up the Maori Battalion in conversation, and you'll notice a shift in their demeanour to one of respect! Add 'C' Company and you earn cookie points.) In the end, I put in 3 litres of the 91 and mixed it with the remaining tank contents: No sweat! He did have a product on the shelf which could be added but I was reluctant as I had never used it before. I have always found the Ruatorians are always welcoming and friendly and I always make a point to visit there when I pass that way.

Moving on, we kept going down to Te Puia Springs. A stop for 'breakfast'. By this time of the trip I am tired of the food available and I realise I am missing the 'home meals' I am used to. Two other locals sitting outside (passing the time of day) and we strike up/join in with their conversation.

Repleted, we carry on with our ride. Towns and villages flyin' by: Tokamaru Bay, Tolaga Bay, Pouawa, Makorori, Gisborne. - We have arrived. 180 kilometres. It was early afternoon but we checked in before 2.00 pm. Unpacked and relaxed. Gisborne was a planned layover, 2 days to give the body and mind to relax and ease the muscles associated with riding.

The last leg to the Wellington area was non-eventful and a night at the Waipawa Motor Camp and on the road for the last leg home. Tired but happy. Seven days is a good maximum length for a ride.



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BMW Motorcycle Club of Aotearoa New Zealand - Risk Management Plan

The BMW Motorcycle Club of Aotearoa New Zealand is an organisation whose members join together for rides to nominated venues and for other social occasions. The organiser nominates the destination and regrouping stages along the way, but otherwise has no influence upon the way that riders behave on the road. There is no element of organised competition in the rides.

Riding Code:

- 1. All Club members on Club rides shall do so as individuals responsible for their own safety and shall take into account the safety of others they encounter on the ride.
- 2. Club members are responsible for ensuring that their motorcycles are in a safe and legal condition, the minimum being to Warrant of Fitness standards.
- 3. Riders, Pillions and sidecar passengers where required, shall have as a minimum standard New Zealand Approved Motorcycle Helmets, and stout footwear, gloves and clothing that will be capable of protecting their body in the event of a mishap.
- 4. Club Members are to go to the aid of any others suffering a mishap.
- 5. Rider organisers shall nominate the destination for the ride

as well as any regrouping locations or other stops. The organiser is not responsible for the other riders' behaviour or safety.

- 6. Riders shall ride at a speed and in a way that is comfortable for them. Do not ride outside your personal comfort envelope.
- 7. If a rider is unfamiliar with the route, they shall arrange to follow another rider who does know the way and who travels at a comfortable pace.
- 8. Riders who decide to travel as a group shall adopt a staggered riding formation such that there is an accepted following distance to the rider immediately in front. A reasonable following distance is indicated by a time of two seconds between riders for dry conditions and longer for inclement conditions and on loose surfaces.
- 9. The Ride Organiser and or the Club are not responsible for the participants' safety, and all participants participate at their own risk. All participants are aware that they are travelling on open public roads and are responsible for their own safety and compliance with the Road Rules and Laws.
