

May's Rides

t's probably fair to say that all Club areas could report more content around the events they had to postpone or cancel rather than the ones which could go ahead, and Auckland is certainly no exception. We did however manage to hold two events during May, a café meet-up and a monthly ride.

Red Shed Palazzo located just off the end of the Southern Motorway has been a bit of a cafe destination staple for years,

consistently delivering ambience, service, coffee, and cuisine. Another bonus is that it sits very near to a variety of riding options.

This time around, the setting was all good, service was up to expectation, and the coffee was great, but the kitchen was clearly an issue. Some club members were quite happy with their offerings but anybody ordering the liver and bacon with toasted ciabatta was in for a world of



disappointment. The liver was overcooked and therefore on the dry/grainy side, the gravy had been over-thickened using corn flour making it gluggy and everything had been placed on top of the toast making it soggy. BMW Update... Auckland

BMW Motorrad NZ - The change is well underway.



nitially, it was in hushed tones, word of a quantum shift around the presence of BMW Motorrad in New Zealand. Those hushed tones grew steadily louder but still, specifics were shrouded, more in the realm of rumour than substance. Eventually, mystery gave way to revelation, the mantle of BMW Motorrad NZ would be passing to Sime Darby. To suggest that Sime Darby is big is akin to suggesting that Mt Cook is a bit of a hill, they bring sophisticated structure, big-picture thinking, and serious horsepower to the table. An announcement by Cyclespot that they would no longer be BMW dealers was an early signal that significant change was underway. The phrase "Flagship Dealership" cropped up early on as lines of communication opened between BMW Motorrad NZ and BWMCNZ.

So, what does the transfer of BMW Motorrad New Zealand to Sime Darby mean, what does a flagship dealership look like, and how does all this impact my personal BMW experience?

BMW Motorrad NZ falls under the umbrella

of SD Distributors NZ Ltd, many of you will have met Brand Manager Dennis Holland at the BOP Rally and witnessed the presentation he gave at our AGM. Everything BMW arrives in NZ via SD Distributors and all BMW franchised dealerships are answerable to Dennis, including the newly established Auckland dealership Continental Motorrad located on Wairau Rd. Your personal BMW experience will be enhanced by improved parts supply, and greater availability of merchandise or accessories, along with the impact of a business structure which has some serious skin in the game from importation to retail sales.

Continental Motorrad Wairau Rd will be the Flagship Dealership and responsibility falls to Dealer Manager Steve Mottershead. I recently had the opportunity to meet with Steve and look at what was happening. Continental BMW's site on Wairau Road is quite large and I had no idea where I should be heading. On arrival, I noted a trail of bikes which began just inside a set of self-


opening doors, so it seemed reasonable to start there. The trail led past car displays to an open-plan office space and a larger collection of bikes, this is where Steve currently calls home.

As pictured, his real home is still being constructed next door with completion expected in July. We chatted at length about his vision and it's clear that Steve is counting the days to moving next door and making this dealership everything that

it can be. We went for a walk so I could see the workshop facility and get a peek at what was going on undercover with the showroom.

The workshop looked impressive with top of the range, Bike-lifts, technical staff, and state-of-the-art diagnostics, and as a bonus, the national parts facility located virtually next to the service floor.

We continued our walk, ending up beyond



the scaffold and shrouding next door. As Steve spoke it became easy to look beyond the construction in process and start to picture the finished product. He explained that another bike lift was going to be located here so that a technician could go over whatever it was that your bike needed or detail around a new bike could be pointed out. The coffee machine was going

here with a lounge-type feel to the space, merchandising and accessories were going to be a big feature and displayed here and here. The space would have a social feel to it with space for the display of all models. By the time we were done, I even found myself starting to count down to opening day.

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BMW Motorcycle Club of Aotearoa New Zealand - Risk Management Plan

The BMW Motorcycle Club of Aotearoa New Zealand is an organisation whose members join together for rides tonominated venues and for other social occasions. The organiser nominates the destination and regrouping stages along the way, but otherwise has no influence upon the way that riders behave on the road. There is no element of organised competition in the rides.

Riding Code:

- 1. All Club members on Club rides shall do so as individuals responsible for their own safety and shall take into account the safety of others they encounter on the ride.
- 2. Club members are responsible for ensuring that their motorcycles are in a safe and legal condition, the minimum being to Warrant of Fitness standards.
- 3. Riders, Pillions and sidecar passengers where required, shall have as a minimum standard New Zealand Approved Motorcycle Helmets, and stout footwear, gloves and clothing that will be capable of protecting their body in the event of a mishap.

- 4. Club Members are to go to the aid of any others suffering a mishap.
- 5. Rider organisers shall nominate the destination for the ride as well as any regrouping locations or other stops. The organiser is not responsible for the other riders' behaviour or safety.
- 6. Riders shall ride at a speed and in a way that is comfortable for them. Do not ride outside your personal comfort envelope.
- 7. If a rider is unfamiliar with the route, they shall arrange to follow another rider who does know the way and who travels at a comfortable pace.
- 8. Riders who decide to travel as a group shall adopt a staggered riding formation such that there is an accepted following distance to the rider immediately in front. A reasonable following distance is indicated by a time of two seconds between riders for dry conditions and longer for inclement conditions and on loose surfaces.
- 9. The Ride Organiser and or the Club are not responsible for the participants' safety, and all participants participate at their own risk. All participants are aware that they are travelling on open public roads and are responsible for their own safety and compliance with the Road Rules and Laws.





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
